What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

My communication and writing skills were critical, particularly when it came to my cover letter. This really was the internship of my dreams, and I relayed that information through my cover letter. I was genuine, and I think they could tell.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I knew that I was interested in criminal law, so I started looking with that in mind. While I had technically missed the application deadline, I sent an email asking them to consider my application. I decided that volunteering more of my time than was required would give me a competitive advantage against other applicants. Ultimately, if I hadn't thought to ask to apply late, I would not have been able to do my dream internship.

What did you do as an intern at Baltimore City State's Attorney's Office?

I assisted the Assistant State's Attorneys (ASA's) in court, focusing mainly on criminal cases. I also assisted with trials and trial preparation, including calling and discussing details of cases with police officers, witnesses, and victims in court. I wrote up Jury Trial slips and community service forms.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

This internship provided me with some unique opportunities such as being tazed and going on a police ride along, which showed me another side of law enforcement. I enjoyed everything, from seeing a case I did investigative work on go to trial, to asking officers for their probable cause, to my daily paperwork. Having this internship made me realize that this is what I want to do after CMU, and that may have been the best part of the whole summer.

What was challenging about your internship?

Traffic court. But, since I want to be an ASA, I will one day have to do traffic dockets, so I am glad I was able to see how the docket is called, as well as good practices to follow when calling the cases.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

It was a big advantage during the interview process to know MySQL and database design principles through IS courses. I also like to see myself as a passionate and effective interpersonal communicator.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I believe that it was helpful to both 1) apply long before the deadline, and 2) start to build a positive relationship with my recruiter (beginning at the information session) so that come interview time the conversations became casual.

What did you do as an intern at BNY Mellon?

My main role was doing Project Management for the advanced gamification of BNY Mellon's social collaboration intranet site. This entailed creating an overview presentation to tell the story of what this gamification was supposed to accomplish, creating the timeline, calling, hosting, and facilitating meetings, making note of action items, and delegating tasks, all while being invested in communication. I worked on side-projects devoted to improving the employee experience at BNY Mellon through technology.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

I thoroughly enjoyed the culture of the company, the relationships I built, the challenging but enjoyable work, and the many activities planned for interns.

What was challenging about your internship?

It was challenging to be discerning about how to communicate effectively and appropriately to different audiences. Ineffective communication is a sure-fire way to ensure your priority is not made others' priority. What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

I worked as a Social Science Research Assistant for course credit during the 2013-2014 school year. My experience running lab experiments, recruiting participants, and using statistical software to perform data analysis all allowed me to be a strong candidate for the position.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I reached out to my previous research advisor for advice and information about what labs or professors were hiring students for the summer. I found this opportunity through my Decision Science advisor who sent out a job description and contact information for the project manager.

What did you do as an intern at the Center for Risk Perception and Communication?

Each day I used REDCap software to follow-up with participants in a study about sexual decision making in adolescent girls by sending texts, emails, letters, and answering questions as well as troubleshooting. I also scanned consent forms for files, proof-read promotional material for the video related to the study, tracked participant response rates, and other duties to help the lab and project run smoothly.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

The internship used many of the skills I practice in my classes to use in real life on a project that will one day turn into an academic paper. I liked using the skills from both my majors to improve the project and be a useful member of the team. The internship also broadened my experiences in research methods and gave me a fuller of experience of what it is like to work in academia full time.

What was challenging about your internship?

I balanced many tasks and responsibilities while working as a Research Assistant. Being able to complete each task in a timely manner and do everything well was a challenge. I also worked hard to make sure I was prioritizing my responsibilities and getting most urgent tasks done first.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

My writing skills definitely gave me an advantage in securing this internship. I had to submit a writing sample as a part of the application process, so my writing skills were an asset. Additionally, I have been involved in a lot of service work both on and off campus.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

As a part of CMU Washington Semester Program (WSP), I had great resources and assistance from program coordinators. It was through the program that I initially heard about the internship. I then researched the Department of Justice extensively and completed the necessary application materials. Additionally I had someone at the Career & Professional Development Center review my cover letter.

What did you do as an intern at the Department of Justice?

My responsibilities varied greatly. I was assigned projects by various attorneys throughout the semester and these assignments ranged from reviewing jail calls and emails on direct case work, to recording Missing in Persons Reports from NGOs, to legislative and legal research.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

I enjoyed the “real life” factor of my internship. It was fascinating to see the implications of the work I did beyond the classroom. For example, I was fortunate enough to work on a Supreme Court Case, as well as three other cases, three pieces of legislation, and one policy change through NGOs. I really enjoyed feeling like my work was making a difference in the world.

What was challenging about your internship?

What I found most challenging was my lack of legal knowledge. I had never dealt with issues such as child trafficking, so there was a very quick learning curve. The important thing about situations like this is establishing realistic expectations. No one expected me to have legal training or expertise. Understanding and embracing my limitations was an important learning experience.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

The ability to communicate my thoughts succinctly and cater to a specific audience in my writing helped tremendously during the interview process. It allowed me to articulate my experience, as well as during my internship to interact with people I was interviewing and communicate information to a wide audience. My editorial experience from my time with The Tartan was also a frequent talking point during the interview process.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I interned within the Customer Service department at Dow Jones during the summer between my sophomore and junior years. I worked with a group of interns to suggest ways that the department could improve communications between customer service representatives and Dow Jones customers. Dow Jones owns products such as The Wall Street Journal, Factiva and Dow Jones Newswires.

What did you do as an intern at Dow Jones?

I copy edited articles for Dow Jones's private equity monthly publication as well as articles for other Dow Jones sources such as the Wall Street Journal. I wrote press release based articles for the company's private equity and venture capital websites. I interviewed members of private equity firms and the companies they invest in for self authored articles.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

My editors were very trusting of me. They allowed me to self-author articles when they originally did not intend for me to be interviewing daily. They also worked closely with me to teach me about private equity, which I knew little about before the internship.

What was challenging about your internship?

Learning about private equity with little knowledge of it beforehand, was challenging. I had to familiarize myself with the ins and outs of private equity to make a complex subject simple for readers.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

I applied for a position that was uniquely suited to my background, capitalizing on my role as a co-president of Moneythink CMU. I believe that in the interview, I was able to demonstrate initiative, a genuine interest in learning, and an ability to juggle multiple things at the same time.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I filled out and submitted an online application. In March, I received an offer for a phone interview. It was about 30-40 minutes long and centered around my resume and why I wanted to work at the Fed. Several days later, I received an offer for an in-person interview. I think I did especially well because I had followed up on the position using the information I had gained during the phone interview.

What did you do as an intern at the Federal Reserve Bank of New York?

On my first day, I was told that my main project would be to analyze annual reports for Foreign Banking Organizations. Within a few weeks, I had taken on a host of additional projects centered around how I could use my experience and fresh perspective to improve the department.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

The work environment at the Bank is incomparable. There is a focus on work-life balance, an engaging community of talented individuals who are always willing to help interns learn, and especially in my position – interns do actual work. The Fed summer internship program truly does focus on helping interns understand what is happening across the Bank, providing resources to grow even after leaving the program, and helping the interns make the most of the summer.

What was challenging about your internship?

I only had one summer to complete my work. Therefore, it was helpful to understand my functions, my project, and the business as much as I could as early as possible.

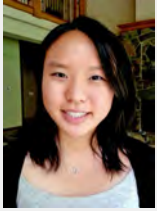

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

Having already been a mentor to a refugee family through CMU's student organization, FORGE, provided me the experience to mentor other refugees. My past experience made it easier for me to communicate with JFS and their clients. I felt prepared for my interview with JFS, because they wanted to hear about my experience in Pittsburgh with my refugee family. Being confident and passionate about what I was talking about really helped secure this internship.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I contacted JFS after attending their annual conference in Pittsburgh. Within a week, they responded and asked me to send them a resume and fill out paperwork.

What did you do as an intern at Jewish Family Service?

I was a mentor to a single mother from Iraq and taught her English. I also helped teach the ESL and job classes that were offered weekly. In addition, I spent some time shadowing case managers in order to learn more about the resettlement process.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

I enjoyed being able to connect with so many people in such a short period of time. As a mentor, I got to hear so many incredible stories from the refugees about their home countries and their experiences. It was a lot of fun teaching English to the refugees, because it pushed me to think of new ways to express ideas.

What was challenging about your internship?

It was a challenge to be cautious about the many different cultures with which I was interacting. Although I was introducing the American culture to the refugees, the refugees also taught me about their own cultures. One of the case workers that I worked with said that we were one of the first links to American culture for the refugees, so it is a crucial time for them.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

My creative writing minor proved to be an asset in securing this internship. The ability to communicate clearly and effectively helped with that task.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I spoke with a family friend, a Boston-based professor of environmental history, who suggested I apply to the Historical Society and kindly provided a reference. I then discovered that a professor I'd done research with had worked with the Society's Director of Research on her book, which I had read as part of my research with her to better familiarize myself with her work. She also kindly provided a reference. I went to Boston for an in-person interview, and received the job offer soon after.

What did you do as an intern at the Massachusetts Historical Society?

My main responsibility was the book prize, but I also worked on other projects such as the society's calendar for the year, inventory on possible books to add to the collection, and a conference program slated for 2017.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

Working to understand both the publishing industry and the historical industry really interested me and gave me a better idea of what I'd like to do after I graduate.

What was challenging about your internship?

I'd never worked in a traditional office setting before, so that transition was a little jarring, simply because office culture runs in its own particular way.

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

I completed a short internship at their parent company the year before, so I was knowledgeable in the company culture as well as what PR entailed and I believe that really stuck out in the interview.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I found this internship the night the application was due, and therefore applied on a whim not knowing what would come of it. Thankfully, I got invited to their Challenge Day, which consisted of 2 interviews and 2 case challenges. I prepared as much as I could for the interviews by reviewing possible questions and researching the company.

What did you do as an intern at the MSL Group?

I monitored for relevant industry news, and sometimes my searches turned into pitches for reporters. I worked on media tracking lists and updated speaking engagements for multiple clients. On one occasion I worked on a blog for a VP of the company. One of the most exciting parts of my internship was that I was able to work on developing a pitch for a client. It was suggested that I start working on the pitch partially because it was a small team, and partially because my managers saw how passionate I was about the subject. I felt very lucky that I was afforded this opportunity!

What did you enjoy about your internship?

I really enjoyed learning about the high tech and healthcare IT industries. I did about 8 hours a week of reading on the newest industry insights just through monitoring and was able to develop a rich understanding of the industries.

What was challenging about your internship?

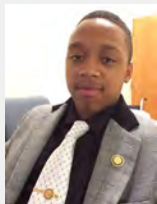

What skills do you have that gave you an advantage in securing this internship?

I was honest about my aspirations and how this specific internship would help me in my endeavors. I was willing to ask for help during my application process, the more people that read your materials the better. Throughout the process I made sure to do my research about the organization.

What are the steps you took to land your internship?

I was applying to several internship opportunities and I had to prioritize my time and resources. By February, I identified this internship as my top choice. I stayed updated on relevant accomplishments and familiarized myself with the office's mission. Once I was called for an interview, I set the date and scheduled a mock interview, to polish my interview skills.

What did you do as an intern at the New York District Attorney's Office?

Some of my projects included listening to the calls of targeted inmates at Riker's Correctional facility, attending trials, attending hearings, and shadowing Assistant District Attorneys at different levels of the court process. I was in charge of organizing all of the target folders for my supervisor's investigation. I also had to contact about 20 phone companies to understand their guidelines for subpoena compliance. Lastly, the interns were instructed to be witnesses during Mock Suppression (that the law interns facilitated) and the college interns had to facilitate Mock Appellate arguments.

What did you enjoy about your internship?

I never stayed in a live court room for extended periods of time before this; nor did I understand how the different levels of the legal system function. I was able to visit the state Appellate Court and Supreme Court. In addition, I enjoyed meeting N.Y. State Supreme Court Justice Eduardo Padro.

What was challenging about your internship?

The most challenging aspect was seeing so many young men of color, like myself, being thrown into jail. I am from similar neighborhoods as these young men and to see them being sentenced to twenty-five years to life in jail is troublesome. Another challenge was managing all of my work. My supervisor gave the interns a variety of tasks and the freedom to complete them at our own speed.

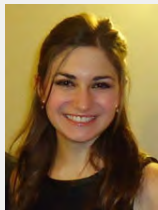

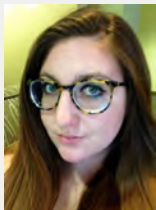

I was responsible for planning speakers and other activities for the 300+ State Department interns. Topics for these events ranged from career advice and networking skills to discussions on current events in the international sphere.

They worked on projects ranging from biotechnology to conflict resolution in unstable countries. This was a great way to learn about the range of careers available at State. 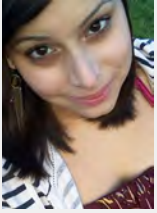
